Class 2 Curriculum Letter Autumn Term

<u>English</u>

For the first half of Autumn term will be focusing on Fiction, writing a letter based on the story *Dear Mother Goose* then exploring a selection of poems from Zim Zam Zoom.

For the second half of the Autumn Term we are focusing on Non Fiction and are exploring the texts *How to Wash a Woolly Mammoth* and *Playing with Friends.*

With our *Dear Mother Goose* text, the Year 1 children will build up to writing a reply letter to a nursery rhyme character. Year 2 will write a letter as well as a reply from Mother Goose. When we explore poetry we will be focusing on reciting some poems by heart with good intonation, expression and rhythm and creating our own poetry.

For our non-fiction writing we will be writing step by step instructions and a piece of writing comparing going to school in the past with going to school today.

Year one will be learning to compose sentences orally, sequence their sentences then check their writing makes sense. We will be focusing on correct letter formation, finger spaces and using Year 2 will be planning and discussing their ideas for the letters/poems and how we will sequence their ideas as well as considering their choice of vocabulary and varying the structure of their sentences.

<u>Maths</u>

<u>Year 1</u>

In Autumn Term we will be: counting to and across 100 forwards and backwards beginning with 0 or 1 or from any given number; counting, reading and writing numbers to 100 in numerals; identifying one more and one less, identifying and representing numbers using objects and pictorial representations including the number line; using the language of equal to, more than, less than (fewer), most, least; exploring the relationship between number and length; comparing numbers and quantities; partitioning; using part whole and bar models and reading and writing numbers from 1 to 20 in numerals and words.

<u>Year 2</u>

In Autumn Term in Year 2 we will be: representing multiples of ten using numerals and names in a variety of ways; estimating the position of multiples of ten on a 0-100 number line; exploring the counting sequence for counting objects to 100 and beyond using knowledge of unitising tens and ones; comparing and adding two, two-digit numbers by partitioning into tens and ones; adding and subtracting zero, one, two and ten within and across the tens boundary; doubling and halving, using addition and subtraction facts for the numbers 5 & 3 and 6 & 3; solving problems; explaining and representing our maths knowledge in different ways including as pictograms and as equations and starting to explore multiplication using the two, five and ten times tables.

<u>PSHE</u> <u>Relationships</u>

This term we will be focusing on relationships. We will consider the roles of different people and how families support us and help us feel cared for. We will understand and recognise privacy, know how to stay safe and the importance of seeking permission. We will also discuss how our behaviour affects others and the importance of being polite and respectful.

<u>Art</u> Spirals

In Art this half term we are using our bodies to create art, using lines, colour, pattern, shape and texture. We will be exploring the work of a variety of international artists including Molly Haslund (Danish), Kolam (Indian), Maria Sibylla Merian (German) and Charles Dessalines (French). We will out create own designs inspired by these artists then evaluate our own and others' work. The children will each be aiven their verv own sketchbook to record their creative journey.

<u>P.E</u> Jumping

In this first half term, we will be learning to apply the correct technique for jumping and explore skipping. Pupils will develop their jumping skills and jump into spaces to avoid the defenders.

The children will understand why, when and where we jump in a game with developing focus and concentration on the correct jumping technique and will start to give and receive feedback concerning the jumping technique.

Gymnastics

For the second half of the Autumn term our focus will be gymnastics. We will learn to move and balance in wide, narrow and curled ways, applying champion gymnastics criteria, on the floor and on apparatus. We will experiment with moving in a variety of wide, narrow and curled ways understanding the differences between each type of movement. The children will demonstrate life skills such as empathy and gratitude as they work safely with each other. Pupils will support each other and share apparatus.

<u>Computing</u>

Technology in our Classroom

In the first half term pupils will become familiar with the term 'technology'. We will classify what constitutes technology and will get to know the main parts of a desktop or laptop computer. We will practise turning on and logging in to a computer and will apply our knowledge of the different parts of a computer to complete mouse-based tasks, open a program, create a picture, write a sentence and learn to edit and save our work. We will also discuss using technology safely.

Digital painting

This half term the children will be exploring digital painting, learning to use line, shape, fill and undo tools. We will select appropriate colours, brush sizes, and brush tools to independently create our own images and will create our own digital painting in the style of an artist. We will compare our preferences when creating paintings on computers and on paper.

For the Autumn term, we will be focussing on singing and performance as well as using untuned percussion in the contexts of Hip Hop and Reggae music. We will learn some features of Hip hop and reggae music and will learn a hip hop and reggae song from memory. We will learn how to play an instrumental part using tuned percussion and how to improvise simple patterns. We will also learn how to compose a simple melody using two given notes and will learn that performance is sharing music with an audience. addition In we will be preparing for our Harvest and

Christmas performances, learning a variety of songs and preparing to perform to an audience.
