1 Aims and purpose

1.1 The aims and purpose of collective worship are:

- to provide an opportunity for the children to worship God;
- to enable children to consider spiritual and moral issues;
- to enable children to explore their own beliefs;
- to encourage participation and response;
- to develop in children a sense of community spirit;
- to promote a common ethos with shared values and to reinforce positive attitudes; • to teach children how to worship.

2 Collective worship

2.1 We understand worship to be a special act or occasion whose purpose is to show reverence to God. Collective worship involves all members of the school coming together and participating in an assembly. We expect everyone to take an active part in the assembly.

2.2 In line with the 1988 Education Reform Act, which states that collective worship should be 'wholly or mainly of a broadly Christian character', we normally base our assemblies on the teachings of Christ and traditions of the Christian Church. However, we conduct our assemblies in a manner that is sensitive to the individual faith and beliefs of all members of the school.

2.3 While the majority of acts of worship in our school are Christian, we also hold assemblies that reflect other religious traditions that are represented in the school and the wider community.

3 Organisation of collective worship

3.1 We hold a daily act of collective worship in our school. This forms part of each assembly, which is normally a whole-school assembly, although sometimes we also hold separate Key Stage specific assemblies.

3.2 We conduct collective worship in a dignified and respectful way. We tell children that the time is a period of calm reflection. We regard it as a special time and expect children to behave in an appropriate way. We ask them to be quiet and thoughtful and to listen carefully to the teachings, prayers and hymns. We create an appropriate atmosphere by using music and sometimes candles or other objects that act as a focal point for the attention of the children.

3.3 The Head of School, the Executive Headteacher or other members of staff normally conduct collective worship, but sometimes local clergy or other representatives of local religious groups lead the sessions instead.

3.4 We take the themes from the traditions of the Christian faith and we often reflect the festivals and events of the Christian calendar. Sometimes the themes reflect and build on topics that we teach as part of the school curriculum.

3.5 Once a week our assembly reflects the achievements and learning of the children. We encourage the children to participate by showing their work to the other children and raising

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issues that they have discussed in their classes. This offers an opportunity to acknowledge and reward children for their achievements both in and out of school. Assemblies play an important part in promoting the ethos of the school, which is that all children are valued and all achievements are recognised. Malborough Primary School is a successful school and we shall celebrate the successes of all the children.

3.6 We invite parents and the local community to all Church services and we encourage them to attend, as this promotes the community spirit of the school and is a practical demonstration of the way the home and the school work together to support the achievements of our children. It would be difficult to invite them into school assemblies due to the lack of space but there are occasions where children will perform in front of their peers and families will be invited.

3.7 We welcome governors' attendance at our assemblies at any time.

4 Right of withdrawal

4.1 We expect all children to attend assembly. However, any parent can request permission for their child to be excused from attending religious worship and the school will make alternative arrangements for the supervision of the child during the period concerned. Parents do not have to explain or give reasons for this. This complies with the 1944 Education Act and was restated in the 1988 Education Reform Act.

4.2 The Executive Headteacher will keep a record of all children who withdraw from collective worship.

4.3 Teachers, including the Executive Headteacher have the same right of withdrawal.

5 Equal opportunities and Special Needs

The staff and Governors at Loddiswell, Modbury and Stokenham Area Primary Schools are committed to ensuring that every child in the school will derive some benefit from collective worship, whatever their gender, ethnicity, physical or mental abilities. Every attempt is made, therefore, to ensure that materials used are appropriate to a range of abilities, aptitudes and interests and reflect the multicultural society we live in.

6 Monitoring and review

6.1 It is the role of a named school governor with responsibility for Religious Education and collective worship to monitor the policy and practice of collective worship.

6.2 The staff review and monitor RE and Collective Worship informally and at Staff Meetings.
